

In line with our Trust policy no holidays will be authorised this year and penalty notices will be issued.

Ofsted & Government directives state that:

Central to raising standards in education and ensuring all pupils can fulfil their potential is an assumption so widely understood that it is insufficiently stated – pupils need to attend school regularly to benefit from their education. Missing out on lessons leaves children vulnerable to falling

behind. Children with poor attendance tend to achieve less in both primary and secondary school.

The government expects: Schools and local authorities to:

- Promote good attendance and reduce absence, including persistent absence; (all pupils to be above 95%)
- Ensure every pupil has access to full-time education to which they are entitled; and,
- act early to address absence.
- Parents to perform their legal duty by ensuring their children of compulsory school age who are registered at school attend regularly.
- All pupils to be punctual to their lessons

I feel sure that attendance is a thorny issue and we appear to be nagging, but we really do need your support to get this right.

Every School Day Counts

Each day a child is absent from school equates to a day of lost learning. Do remember that we can support your children in school if they have sniffles and snuffles rather than keeping them at home.

From reception to the end of primary school, children's digital journey changes a lot.


